Harvest Time

Squirrel Nutkin has been busy too, gathering acorns from our oak trees and storing them in his nest for the winter.

(The children love to sing the Squirrel Nutkin song in our circle)

Autumn also is the harvest time of year,

when the fruits of human labor are gathered and transformed by human hands. In the preschool, rosy red apples are turned into sweet applesauce and warm apple crisp. The children helped scrub, polish and chop apples for these yummy treats. Pumpkins were carved into Jack-O-Lanterns and their seeds roasted for a salty snack! Pumpkins were also baked into pumpkin bread and sweet muffins. The golden corn has been shucked, pounded and picked to make corn on the cob, popcorn and corn bread. Oh, the children have worked hard and their tummies were full!

The kindergarten children also harvested marigolds, which we used to dye our Eurythmy slippers so golden and bright.



In a large bowl, whisk together pumpkin, oil, eggs and sugar until smooth. Sprinkle baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger and cloves over batter and whisk until well combined. Add flour and stir with a spoon, just until mixed. Scrape into buttered muffin tins. In a small dish, or empty measuring cup, stir sugar and cinnamon together. Sprinkle over top of batter.

Pumpkin Muffins

Preheat oven to 350 and bake 15-20 minutes

1 15-oz can (1-3/4 cups)
pumpkin puree
1/2 cup cooking oil or melted
butter
3 large eggs
1-2/3 cups granulated sugar
1-1/2 teaspoons baking
powder
3/4 tsp baking soda
3/4 tsp fine sea or table salt
3/4 tsp ground cinnamon

1/4 tsp fresh grated nutmeg
1/4 tsp ground ginger
Two pinches of ground cloves
2-1/4 cups all-purpose flour
To Finish
1 tablespoon granulated sugar

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

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Leaf Crowns

You will need

- Lots of recently fallen leaves with stems.
- A basket to hold the leaves.

What to do

1. Spend some time gathering the leaves you will use. Your children will want to help you with the gathering. Note: Very dry, brittle leaves will disintegrate very quickly. Use fairly large, freshly fallen leaves. 2. Sit in a place where you can see the children playing and where they can see what you are doing.


3. Take two leaves and remove the stem of one at its base. Overlap the tip of one leaf and the base of the other and use the stem to attach the two leaves by pushing it down through the place where the two leaves overlap and back up again, like a straight pin.


4. Continue to attach leaves to each other in this way. Try the crown on your child 's head and when it is big enough, attach the last leaf to the first in the same way. A crown! –From Earthways by C. Petrash
